The annual open house was a huge success, giving everyone a chance to look at what others have done in their trek. There was also a book exchange, a yard sale, and everywhere you looked, someone was asking questions or helping to figure out problems, or trying to find hidden animals in the murals.



In another article in this newsletter, trip planning tips are provided for planning your own motorhome journey. Fantasy RV Tours is another way to go. This company offers a pre-planned travel itinerary including reservations for camping, events, excursions and selected meals. RVers meet at a predetermined Rally Point' and become a group – guided by professional leaders [WagonMaster & TailGunner*]. The TailGunner is behind the last traveler and offers assistance to anyone in the group needing a helping hand. At each destination a pre-selected campsite is waiting and planned events scheduled.

Fantasy RV Tours offers RV vacation tours to Alaska, Canada, Mexico, as well New Zealand and Austrailia. IN the U.S. itineraries include Civil War battle sites, national park tours, fall foilage tours of New England, and others. Tour prices are around \$5,300 to \$10,800 for 27 – 40 day tours.

In 2014 **John and Marie Turner**, NWTFC members and past president of the club, went on a Fantasy Tour vacation trip to the Canadian Maritime Provinces – New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia. This was their third trip with Fantasy Tours. They have also traveled with the organization to the Northeast Canadian Provinces and the Calgary Stampede.

Why did you choose a planned trip with Fantasy Tours?

We choose to travel with Fantasy Tours because they were going someplace we wanted to go, they had taken wonderful care of us when we went to Mexico in 2006, and their planning for the trip is very complete. As far as advantages I would say that they save a person an awful lot of planning, know some of the best places to visit, and have access to tickets that as an individual you cannot get unless you do your planning a long time ahead. They make campground reservations well ahead, in locations close to places of interest, that are located a reasonable distance apart so you always have time to visit attractions along the route.

Would you do it again?

Yes! A trip planned and organized by a "for profit" company is expensive, but their trips are well planned and they have experienced people that are leading the trip. They take you places you may not go on your own. For example, there is a show in Halifax, NS called the International Tattoo. Thiis a show highlighting the traditions of Nova Scotia with bagpipes, highland dancers and military traditions. This event only occurs during one week of the summer, and we went to it. The trip is planned around being in Halifax at the correct time.

Did you have any trials on your cross-country trip?

We had a great trip to the northeast and while on our trip into Canada. The smaller size of our Trek allowed us to easily fit into all of the campground and to stop at some of the attractions where space was limited.

On our trip home we did need to have our transmission rebuilt. We were lucky to end up at a transmission shop that rebuilt the equivalent transmission in pickups on a regular basis because they get burned up clearing snow in the winter. Our second mechanical issue is something that all Trek owners can expect to experience at some time. The ignition switch provided on our chassis carries a significant current and is subject to failure. We started having trouble getting the engine to start and the burned contact finally fully failed while we were driving down the road. Engine stopped and we coasted to the side if the road. The switch is actually a block of switches low on the back of the steering wheel post. Difficult to get to but fairly easy to replace.



PLANNING AN EXTENDED TRIP Part II

This is the second article on extended trip planning. These are some tips that may be helpful that come from my personal experience and perspective. Some of these ideas may work for you and some may not – if it helps, use it; otherwise chalk it up to someone else's crazy way of doing things.

What shall we do?

Now that is a question for motorhome travelers! We will do whatever we want to do – and we get to decide. For some people a motorhome provides the means to find a quiet place to park and enjoy the solitude. For Trekkers that may be a peaceful spot beside a river like the USFS campground we found in the Bighorn Mountains above Buffalo, Wyoming at 8,600 feet. What a peaceful night we had beside the meadow with a rippling river running through it. For others the motorhome is the means to travel to where the action is: fishing, golfing, hunting, hiking, etc.

However, for people traveling across this great land, they probably want to see, do, and experience things that are different than back home. Three are four written sources that I find provide helpful insights, suggested itineraries, and information on historic sites and attractions: AAA Tour Books, Fodor's, Frommer's, and Moon travel books. If I am planning a long trip, my first stop is the local AAA office for tour books and maps. The AAA books provide basic information on cities with information on the major attractions. These books even indicate where the AAA membership card may provide a discount.

However, the other travel books provide more helpful and detailed information. Often a walking tour is suggested with maps to indicate the best way to see the key attractions. If a site has a star to indicate it is a choice or "best bet" then you know it is a worthwhile stop.

Perhaps one of the **best online helps is "TripAdvisor.com.**" This site has information on just about any travel destination throughout the world. In the "Things to Do" section the attractions are ranked as to which are the best places to visit. The site provides a 1-5 ranking and reviews of each attraction by people who been there.

Where shall we eat?

What a question, we own a Trek so of course we are going to save money by eating in our motorhome. Besides, our own cooking always tastes best. We have heard of some people who own those big fancy 45 ft. motorhomes that say the only reason their motorhome has a kitchen is become it came with one. There are times when it is nice to eat out for variety and give the cook a break.

Choices abound – national chains provide consistency and a familiar menu, but if that is what you want, why leave home? We like to sample the local cuisine and discover new tastes. Local festivals sometimes provide interesting foods to sample. Ask locals when checking into a campground about the good places to eat. The tour books mentioned above also provide interesting restaurants to try. Thanks to Frommer's and Fodor's we found The Salt Lick – our favorite Texas BBQ place near Austin. It is 12 miles outside of town in Driftwood and directions are needed. In Boise we discovered a Basque restaurant that was delightful and very authentic.

Every trip is an adventure. It is what you make it. Make yours special!



Have you ever had the experience while sitting outside your motorhome in the morning while those who must get on the road are revving their engines?

"I watched fellow RV'ers head out on another day's journey. Without intervention some of them might not have a great day.

A neighbor, two sites down from us, pulled out and my wife noticed his satellite dish was still up. I quickly got up and a quick blast of the horn got his attention. Yes - I have stopped those leaving a park with toad brakes on, antennas up, and numerous other things. Since I am not infallible, I hope fellow RVers do the same for me.





The **FMCAssist** Medical Emergency and Travel Assistance Program is an association-paid member benefit. No sign-up required. If you are a NW Trek Fun Club member, you have also joined FMCA and you are covered. FMCAssist is included as a portion of the annual dues for all FMCA members.

If you have not done so already, go to the FMCA website (www.fmca.com).

- Print FMCAssist member I.D. card member sign-in required
- Print FMCAssist Brochure includes plan description and clipable Discount Drug Card; member sign-in required

Highlights of FMCAssist include:

- emergency evacuation/repatriation
- emergency medical reunion
- · return of mortal remains
- return of dependents
- RV/vehicle return (limited to North America)
- pet return.

FMCAssist coverage is available to members worldwide as long as you are more than 100 miles from home. You can be traveling in a motorhome, car, plane, ship, or motorcycle to be eligible for this benefit. If you are a full-time RVer, you are always considered 100 miles from home. Some exclusions and limitation amounts pertain to this benefit.

FMCAssist coverage is provided by Seven Corners and is underwritten by Lloyd's of London. What do you need to do to enroll in this program? Absolutely nothing! As long as you continue to keep your FMCA dues current, you will be covered.

When should I call FMCAssist?

- Always call 911 first in any emergency.
- Anytime a physician has advised that you or your covered family member is in need of emergency medical transportation.



- Anytime you or your covered family member has been admitted as an inpatient at a hospital, or anytime you feel you may need future assistance with transportation due to a medical situation.
- Anytime you have general questions about your coverage and the services available through FMCAssist.

What happens when I call FMCAssist?

- If immediate assistance is required, you will provide your name and FMCA member number in order to take the next necessary actions.
- Details of your current situation will be requested.
- We will answer any questions you have about your coverage and benefits.
- We cannot discuss your medical condition or transportation arrangements with your family members (unless specifically authorized by you) or with any other member of FMCA.
