2020 WILDFIRE SEASON IMPACTS PACIFIC NW

The 2020 wildfire season in Washington, Oregon, and California is one that will leave blackened hillsides and snags for many years.

By September wildfires in Washington had burned over 626,000 acres, 181 homes had been lost, and one death occurred. The 2020 fire season saw more individual fires than in any other recorded year. Gov. <u>Jay Inslee</u> declared a state of emergency for all of Washington, with fires burning on the Olympic Peninsula and in Eastern Washington.

The **2020 Oregon wildfire season** was one of the most destructive on record, killing at least 10 people, burning more than 1,000,000 acres of land, and destroying hundreds of homes. The fires were small until a devastating east wind arose the evening of Labor Day (9/7). (We left a campground in the dark at 10:30 the next morning.) Many of the scenic highways crossing the Cascades are scarred – the McKenzie (OR 126), Santiam (OR 22), Umpqua (OR138) and the upper Clackamas River were affected. Favorite campgrounds, scenic views, and rural communities have been devastated.

Let us guard the natural resources entrusted to us, pray for those who suffered loss, and seek the restoration of these beautiful areas.

RALLY COORDINATOR NEEDED

WHAT'S HAPPENING ON THE NATIONAL FMCA SCENE? PART II



What happened in Part I?

When last reported – the FMCA national Executive Board was embroiled in some heavy financial discussions. President Jon Walked called for the board to eliminate the FMCAssist medical evacuation program save the \$900,000 in premium expense. He also called for the annual membership dues to be rolled back to \$50 – the same as it was before the dues increase was instituted to cover the FMCAssist premiums. The Executive Board rejected these recommendations and called for a further review of the budget figures. Board members saw FMCAssist as a valuable member benefit that was overwhelmingly approved by the Governing Board in 2019.

Report on recent happenings

On September 9th President Walker reported that the Risk Management Committee, headed by Ned Boston was able to negotiate a reduced premium for the FMCAssist program through another company. The reduced premium meant that the deficit in the proposed budget was eliminated. The 2021 budget (effective October 1) will have a positive surplus, will keep the FMCAssist program, and will keep the dues at the current \$75 per year.

A marketing consultant has been hired to look at everything that FMCA is doing from a marketing perspective. The consultant's report will be presented to the Executive Board and then filtered down to the chapters.

Other related news

Camping World Holdings Inc. and Good Sam, announced on September 9th that the print publications Trailer Life and MotorHome would cease publication after the December 2020 issue. A new website (RV.com) will be launched and supported by a new publication, RV Magazine. It was reported that RV.com and RV Magazine will offer readers exclusive product reveals and reviews for all RV types, top travel destinations, recipes, money saving ideas and trending products. New product innovations and solutions that are driving the industry will be spotlighted, along with safety tips for the outdoors.

Others have noted that these publications have seemed to have become not much more than a marketing tool for Camping World, packed with ads from RV manufacturers and Camping World. Any new efforts are likely to be aimed at promoting RVs and services sold by Camping World or Gander RV and products in their stores.

FMCA's magazine, **Family RVing**, is nationally recognized for its content. It is the official publication of FMCA. Surveys indicate that the magazine is one of the key reasons new members join FMCA. FMCA continues to be the world's largest non-profit RV group. It is an association of RV owners that is governed by the members through chapters and the Governing Board. Each chapter is represented through a national director elected by the chapter.

Standing in shock in front of a very open window.


